Experts from various academic fields presented papers on, amongst others, scenario methodologies, the pit-falls of doing social research, conducting postgraduate research, and steps to achieve success in postgraduate research.

Presenters were Dr Pieter Fourie, Research Associate at Macquarie University (Australia) and Pretoria University; Prof. Hussein Solomon from our Department of Political Science; Dr Henriëtte van den Berg from our Department of Psychology; Dr Sethulego Matebesi from our Department of Sociology; Henk Boshoff, Head: Motheo Administrative Unit; Prof. Christo Heunis from our Centre for Health Systems Research and Development; and Dr Chitja Twala from our Department of History.

The programme is aimed at the advancement of political knowledge and the development of political, management-oriented skills in an environment of rapid change. ### **GOVERNANCE AND POLITICAL TRANSFORMATION**

### The ideal qualification

This well-established Programme successfully brings 21st century politics to politicians and decision makers of today – nationally and internationally.

The aims of the qualifications are the advancement of political knowledge and the development of political management—orientated skills in an environment of rapid change. This Programme was created to satisfy the need for institutional capacity building, leadership development and the promotion of a value system which complements good governance and forms the basis of a democratic government.

### **BA Governance and Political Transformation**

Duration is 3 years full-time on the Main Campus. Main disciplines are Political Science, Public Management and Communication Science.

<u>Admission requirements:</u> National Senior Certificate. Application Point (AP) of 30. Achievement level 4 (50%) for language of instruction.

# Postgraduate Diploma in Governance and Political Transformation

Duration is one year, by completing eight (8) modules in areas that include, amongst others: Political Transformation and Management; Political Environment; Conflict Management; Cooperative Governance; Communication Management and Municipal Governance.

Admission requirements: B Degree or four year National Diploma (NQF level 7). Average mark of 60% or higher will be considered. Closing date for applications: 4 November 2011.

# Masters Degree in Governance and Political Transformation

Duration is one year, which includes examination on Research Methodology and the writing of an Extended Mini-dissertation.

<u>Admission requirements:</u> Postgraduate Diploma in Governance and Political Transformation or Honours qualification (NQF level 8). Average mark of 60% or higher will be considered. Closing date for applications: 4 November 2011.

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
